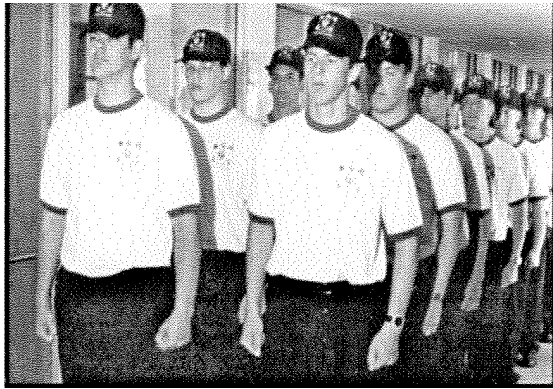

The purpose of Junior Cadet Week is to give 20 young men and 20 young women a better insight into the problems faced by today's law enforcement officers. It is an opportunity for them to spend a week at the Patrol Academy experiencing the same training as undertaken by a typical Ohio State

Highway Patrol Trooper.

Junior Cadet Week is a one-time opportunity available only to young men and young women attending Buckeye Boys State and Buckeye Girls State in the current year and to the children of Ohio State Highway Patrol employees who will be a senior in the upcoming high school year. There is no other chance to participate in the program.

If you have an interest in a future career in law enforcement, Junior Cadet Week is seeking you!

Junior Cadet Week Training Highlights

- Physical training; both structured and recreational
- Unarmed self-defense
- Alcohol impairment countermeasures
- Use of video tape in training
- Use of aircraft in law enforcement
- A field trip is conducted to observe troopers performing operational tasks
- First aid training
- Radar training
- Weapons familiarization
- Criminal laws - officer violator contacts
- Water safety

Junior Cadet Week will be conducted at the Ohio State Highway Patrol Training Academy in Columbus, June 19-23, 2006.

Ohio State Highway Patrol instructors comprise the staff of Junior Cadet Week and the facilities and equipment of the Ohio State Highway Patrol are provided as a public service.

Every 2006 Buckeye Boys State delegate and Buckeye Girls State delegate are eligible to make application to attend Junior Cadet Week. Twenty young men attending Buckeye Boys State and twenty young women attending Buckeye Girls State will be selected from among all applicants, by an independent review board, to attend Junior Cadet Week. They will join ten sons and daughters of current Highway Patrol employees, who will be a senior in the upcoming high school year.

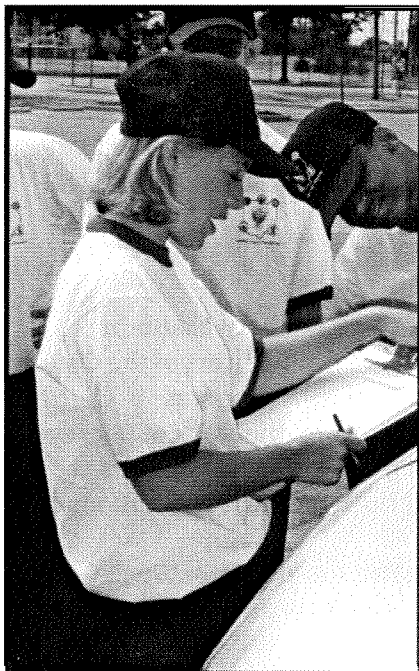
The only requirements for making application to attend Junior Cadet Week are that you be physically fit and able to participate in the whole program. An interest in public service would be an added plus.

In order to qualify for consideration, you must exercise all of your responsibilities as a citizen of Buckeye Boys State or Buckeye Girls State and submit a written application available at each program.

Interviews will be set at Boys State and Girls State for each applicant. Boys State delegates who make application will be interviewed by officers of the State Highway Patrol and members of the State Highway Patrol Auxiliary. Officers of the State Highway Patrol and members of the American Legion Auxiliary will interview Girls State delegates who make application.

The site, times, and locations to pick up applications will be announced to you upon your arrival at Buckeye Boys State or Buckeye Girls State.

Junior Cadet Week is jointly sponsored by the Ohio State Highway Patrol, the Ohio State Highway Patrol Auxiliary, the Ohio American Legion, and the Ohio American Legion Auxiliary.



The State Highway Patrol Auxiliary is an organization of nearly 200 members formed by the Highway Patrol and the Ohio American Legion in World War II who for over 50 years have trained and worked to assist the Highway Patrol in disasters, accidents, and administrative activities.

The Ohio American Legion is one of the largest departments in the American Legion with a membership of over 165,000 in 625 American Legion Posts throughout the state. The Ohio American Legion conducts a variety of youth-related programs and is a dedicated supporter of Ohio law enforcement agencies.

The Ohio American Legion Auxiliary is an organization of over 55,000 women who actively promote the youth programs of the American Legion plus provide countless hours of support to area veterans' hospitals, nursing homes, and many community projects.

Special Note

Girls and Boys Staters selected for Junior Cadet Week must provide their own transportation to the Ohio State Highway Patrol Academy, which is located at 740 East 17th Avenue in Columbus. Cadet Week participants are to report to the Academy between 6:00 P.M. and 8:00 P.M. on Monday, June 19, and will graduate at 9:30 A.M. on Friday, June 23 in ceremonies open to family and friends.

Applications for Junior Cadet Week

Application forms for Junior Cadet Week will be available at Buckeye Boys State and Buckeye Girls State from officers of the Ohio State Highway Patrol serving on the staff of each program.

The officers of the State Highway Patrol and the staffs of Buckeye Boys State and Buckeye Girls State will provide announcements at each program on the dates, times, and sites to obtain applications and schedule interviews.

Those individuals selected to attend Junior Cadet Week will be formally announced at Buckeye Boys State and Buckeye Girls State.
